What are community businesses?




Enterprises that are owned and run democratically by members of the community, on behalf of the community

They trade for the benefit of the local area with profits going back into the business or being used to support other local community activities

They are often created to address needs and issues that exist within a community

The impacts on a local community

- Overcoming isolation, particularly for elderly and those without transport
- Training, employment, young people's training
- Volunteering benefits to the individual
- Community cohesion
- Environmental local produce, reduction in plastics, etc
- Support hub for those in need, e.g. IT provision, food banks
- Community activities e.g. book exchange, local food fairs, art groups, knitting groups etc
























- As run separately from the church, access to secular funding is possible
